Health Outcomes tell us how long people live on average within a community, and how much physical and mental health people experience in a community while they are alive. Health Outcomes includes quality of life and length of life.




Duval County is faring worse than the average county in Florida for Health Outcomes, and worse than the average county in the nation.

Opportunities for Improvement: higher adult smoking rates, higher adult obesity rates, high rate of preventable hospital stays and high rate of sexually transmitted infections





NEIGHBORHOOD & BUILT ENVIRONMENT

Geography and Governance

Duval County is a consolidated city-county government located on the northeast coast of Florida. It includes the cities of Jacksonville, Baldwin, and the beach communities of Jacksonville Beach, Neptune Beach, and Atlantic Beach. Jacksonville is the largest city geographically in the contiguous forty-eight states, and Duval County has a land area of over 800 square miles. Urban, suburban, and pockets of rural areas comprise the geographic make-up of Duval County. On October 1, 1968, the government of Duval County was merged with the government of the City of Jacksonville. However, the Duval County cities of Atlantic Beach, Baldwin, Jacksonville Beach, and Neptune Beach are not included in the corporate limits of Jacksonville.

NEIGHBORHOOD & BUILT ENVIRONMENT

Social Vulnerability Index (SVI)

Social vulnerability is a set of factors such as poverty, lack of access to transportation, and crowded housing that may weaken a community's ability to prevent human suffering and financial loss in a disaster. An area receives a Social Vulnerability Index Score (SVI) from 0 to 1.0 in which 0 is the lowest vulnerability and 1.0 is the highest vulnerable population.

Socioeconomic status (below 150% poverty, unemployed, housing cost burden, no high school diploma, no health insurance)

Household characteristics (aged 65 or older, aged 17 or younger, civilian with a disability, single-parent households, English language proficiency)

Racial and ethnic minority status (Hispanic or Latino (of any race); Black and African American, Not Hispanic or Latino; American Indian and Alaska Native, Not Hispanic or Latino; Asian, Not Hispanic or Latino; Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, Not Hispanic or Latino; Two or More Races, Not Hispanic or Latino; Other Races, Not Hispanic or Latino)

Duval County's overall SVI rate is 0.697, which indicates a medium to high level of vulnerability compared to other communities. This means that Duval County is more likely to experience negative outcomes during emergencies, disasters, or disease outbreaks. When considering thematic SVI, the Racial and Ethnic Minority Status factor has the highest SVI (0.8788), and the Socioeconomic Status factor (0.5152) has the lowest.




