Health Outcomes tell us how long people live on average within a community, and how much physical and mental health people experience in a community while they are alive. Health Outcomes includes quality of life and length of life.




Flagler County is faring worse than the average county in Florida for Health Outcomes, and better than the average county in the nation.

Health Factors represent those things we can improve to live longer and healthier lives. Health Factors include health behaviors, clinical care, social and economic factors, and the physical environment.



Flagler County is faring worse than the average county in Florida for Health Factors, and about the same as the average county in the nation.

Areas of Strength: low rate of physical inactivity

Opportunities for Improvement: higher rate of adult smoking, high rate of adult obesity and a high rate of excessive drinking.





NEIGHBORHOOD & BUILT ENVIRONMENT

Geography and Governance

Flagler County is 31 miles south of St. Augustine and 24 miles north of Daytona Beach. The county comprises five municipalities – Beverly Beach, Bunnell, Flagler Beach, Marineland, and Palm Coast. The municipalities have incorporated roughly 48 percent of the land area within Flagler County. While most of the county's population lives on Palm Coast, the city of Bunnell has the largest landmass. The remaining 52 percent of the land is within the unincorporated area of Flagler County. The Atlantic Ocean Beachfront is 18 miles long with pristine beaches. There are more than 40 parks and preserves and 90+ miles of hiking, biking, and paddling trails. Flagler County is desirable for tourists, visitors, residents, and businesses. Flagler County's population is distributed among its five municipalities and unincorporated areas

NEIGHBORHOOD & BUILT ENVIRONMENT

Social Vulnerability Index (SVI)

Social vulnerability is a set of factors such as poverty, lack of access to transportation, and crowded housing that may weaken a community's ability to prevent human suffering and financial loss in a disaster. An area receives a Social Vulnerability Index Score (SVI) from 0 to 1.0 in which 0 is the lowest vulnerability and 1.0 is the highest vulnerable population.

Socioeconomic status (below 150% poverty, unemployed, housing cost burden, no high school diploma, no health insurance)

Household characteristics (aged 65 or older, aged 17 or younger, civilian with a disability, single-parent households, English language proficiency)

Racial and ethnic minority status (Hispanic or Latino (of any race); Black and African American, Not Hispanic or Latino; American Indian and Alaska Native, Not Hispanic or Latino; Asian, Not Hispanic or Latino; Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, Not Hispanic or Latino; Two or More Races, Not Hispanic or Latino; Other Races, Not Hispanic or Latino)

Flagler County's overall SVI rate is 0.3121, which indicates a low to medium level of vulnerability compared to other communities. This means that Flagler County is less likely to experience negative outcomes during emergencies, disasters, or disease outbreaks. When considering thematic SVI, the Racial and Ethnic Minority Status has the highest SVI (0.6277), and the Housing Type and Transportation (0.0554) has the lowest.


