Health Outcomes tell us how long people live on average within a community, and how much physical and mental health people experience in a community while they are alive. Health Outcomes includes quality of life and length of life.




Nassau County is faring worse than the average county in Florida for Health Outcomes, and better than the average county in the nation.

Health Factors: 5th out of 67 counties

Health Factors represent those things we can improve to live longer and healthier lives. Health Factors include health behaviors, clinical care, social and economic factors, and the physical environment.



Nassau County is faring about the same as the average county in Florida for Health Factors, and better than the average county in the nation.

Areas of Strength: lower rate of physical inactivity, higher rate of mammography screening and flu vaccinations, higher rate of high school completion, and lower rate of children in poverty

Opportunities for Improvement: higher rates of adult smoking, adult obesity, and excessive drinking; higher ratio of primary care physicians per population





NEIGHBORHOOD & BUILT ENVIRONMENT

Geography and Governance

Nassau County encompasses approximately 649 square miles of the northeast region of the state. Nassau County borders the Atlantic Ocean to the east, Duval County, FL to the south, Baker County, FL to the southwest, Charlton County, GA to the west, and Camden County, GA to the north. The county seat is Fernandina Beach, and a Board of County Commissioners serves as the governing authority. Five members representing the five-county districts make up the board and are elected at large for staggered four-year terms. Amelia Island's resorts and beaches serve as an attraction for tourism. In contrast, the Port of Fernandina is a gateway for international business throughout the county and the southeast United States.

NEIGHBORHOOD & BUILT ENVIRONMENT

Social Vulnerability Index (SVI)

Social vulnerability is a set of factors such as poverty, lack of access to transportation, and crowded housing that may weaken a community's ability to prevent human suffering and financial loss in a disaster. An area receives a Social Vulnerability Index Score (SVI) from 0 to 1.0 in which 0 is the lowest vulnerability and 1.0 is the highest vulnerable population.

Socioeconomic status (below 150% poverty, unemployed, housing cost burden, no high school diploma, no health insurance)

Household characteristics (aged 65 or older, aged 17 or younger, civilian with a disability, single-parent households, English language proficiency)

Racial and ethnic minority status (Hispanic or Latino (of any race); Black and African American, Not Hispanic or Latino; American Indian and Alaska Native, Not Hispanic or Latino; Asian, Not Hispanic or Latino; Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, Not Hispanic or Latino; Two or More Races, Not Hispanic or Latino; Other Races, Not Hispanic or Latino)

Nassau County's overall SVI rate is 0.2539, which indicates a low to medium level of vulnerability compared to other communities. This means that Nassau County is less likely to experience negative outcomes during emergencies, disasters, or disease outbreaks. When considering thematic SVI, the Racial and Ethnic Minority Status factor has the highest SVI (0.4273), and the Socioeconomic Status factor (0.2278) has the lowest.






